'Where the Wild Things Are' dance

Invite your class to participate in an exciting dance sequence based around Maurice Sendak's *Where the Wild Things Are* with these instructions.

Suggested music: Job – A Masque for Dancing by Ralph Vaughan Williams. Use Scene IV, 'Job's Dream', 'Dance of Plague, Pestilence, Famine and Battle' followed by the beginning of Scene V, 'Dance of the Messengers'.

- Six children lie very still on the floor in a rectangle shape to represent a **bed**.
- ('Job's Dream' music starts.) **Max** slowly enters and walks around, head hanging. He steps into the **bed** and goes to sleep.
- After a slight pause, the rest of the class enter from all sides as a **forest**. The **forest** starts to slowly grow and surround the **bed**.
- Max wakes, sits up and watches as the forest grows.
- The **bed** smoothly transforms into a **boat** (ends pointed) and the **forest** transforms into **waves**.
- Max steps out of boat and the waves fade away in all directions.
- ('Dance of Plague, Pestilence, Famine and Battle' starts.)
- Nine wild things enter, roar (in mime), gnash teeth, roll eyes, claw air and surround Max.
- Max points, indicating 'be still'.
- The wild things form a semi-circular line and bow to Max.
- Max divides them into three groups.
- The first **group** performs a wild dance to him, then the second, then the third, then all together (there are four sections of 'wild' music to suggest this).
- At the three loud brass blasts, **Max** points three times to the first **group** they run away.
- Three more loud brass blasts **Max** points to the second **group** who run away.
- Third set of blasts Max points to the third group, who run away.
- The six 'bed/boat' children resume the boat shape, the rest of the class become a wild sea around it. Max gets into the boat. After the last big 'wave' in the music, all waves fade away to sides.
- ('Dance of the Messengers' music starts.) Max steps out of the boat. It transforms smoothly back into a bed.
- He walks, bewildered, around his bedroom, staring.
- He shrugs, gets into bed, eats his supper, then lies down and goes to sleep. (Fade music down to end.)
