Bimwili and the Zimwi

About the story

This story is similar to many stories in which the main character is trapped (usually inside a sack). In this story the girl is trapped inside a drum and made to sing – until she recognises her own family and is released.

Getting to know the story well

After sharing the story, use the following activities to embed the story in the children's minds.

Drama

■ Invite the children to role-play the opening scene of the story.

Art

 Illustrate the story with close observational drawings and paintings of shells.

Music

• Set the songs to a simple percussive pattern, using drum beats and singing.

Research

• Find Zanzibar on a map.


Discuss

 Should the girls have gone back with Bimwili? What message lies behind the story?

Retelling the story aloud

 This story is in two parts. The children will need plenty of rehearsal, focusing on the two parts in turn, in order to get their oral retelling fluent.
