Using expanded noun phrases

How do you use expanded noun phrases to give complicated information?




Learn

A noun is a word for a person, place or thing.

There are different types of noun: common (car, dog) and proper (London, Kate).

A proper noun always starts with a capital letter.

A noun phrase contains a noun as its main word and often contains a determiner, preposition or adjective.



Key words

expanded noun phrase

An **expanded noun phrase** has additional information about a noun.

scientist can be expanded to.

determiner preposition



You can have more than one expanded noun phrase about different nouns in the same sentence. You could develop the example above to become:

The mad scientist, with wild, curly hair, strode purposefully into his cluttered laboratory.

expanded noun phrase

You can take this even further!

The mad scientist, with wild, curly hair, strode purposefully into his cluttered laboratory, closing **the heavy oak door** loudly behind him.

In 21 words, we have built up a detailed picture of the scientist, the laboratory and the door.

We could keep on adding more details.
